Richard C. Lisitano, M.S., RPh

Richard “Rich” Lisitano is the president of L+M Healthcare and executive vice president of Yale New Haven Health. He assumed his current role in July of 2023.

L+M Healthcare includes Lawrence + Memorial Hospital in New London, CT, and Westerly Hospital in Westerly, RI. In addition, L+M Healthcare includes a comprehensive ambulatory network serving Southeastern Connecticut and Southern Rhode Island.

Prior to becoming president at L+M Healthcare, Mr. Lisitano was senior vice president of Operations at Yale New Haven Hospital (YNHH). He has been employed at YNHH since 1986 when he joined the organization as assistant director of Pharmacy.

Throughout his almost 40-year career, Mr. Lisitano has an outstanding reputation for consistently optimizing operations, improving performance, and delivering sustainable financial results.

His contributions with Yale New Haven Health include growth in departments that include Genetics, Neurosciences, Oncology, and Urology. He was also the executive lead for developing, executing, and integrating an electronic medical record platform across each of the health system’s campuses.

Mr. Lisitano earned a Master of Science from The Ohio State University and a Bachelor of Science in Pharmacy from the University of Connecticut.

A Connecticut native, he and his wife Ann are the proud parents of three young men.



Mitchell College President
Tracy Y. Espy, Ph.D.

Dr. Tracy Y. Espy became the eighth president of Mitchell College in July 2020, the first African American woman to hold the position. She brings more than 30 years of experience in higher education and servant leadership. Drawn to Mitchell College’s unique and powerful mission, President Espy is dedicated to providing access to quality higher education, increasing opportunities for a diverse student population, and meeting the workforce and service needs of the great City of New London and State of Connecticut.

President Espy has led the development and implementation of a strategic plan for the College that is focused on growth through continuous improvement to meet the learning needs of all students, including neurodivergent individuals and adult learners. Fostering a culture of service and community engagement for faculty, staff, and students alike, she has strengthened the College’s roots and increased its visibility and value both locally and regionally. In doing so she has expanded the College’s community partnerships throughout the state. Under her leadership the College received its largest-ever gift.

President Espy has led the development of many new programs to serve both traditional and nontraditional students and address the region’s most pressing

workforce needs. Most recent is the Bachelor of Science in Nursing (BSN) program, which features the state-of-the-art Edward and Mary Lord Nursing Simulation and Skills Laboratory. Other programs created during her tenure include The Mitchell Hub for Digital Innovation & Educational Excellence, with a unique combination of online learning and in-person support for individuals and corporate groups seeking career skills and credentials. Other recent programs include Professional Studies, offering streamlined and supported degree completion to adult learners, and the post-graduate STAIRs program for neurodivergent individuals seeking support toward career, graduate school, and independent living.

Serving on the Governor’s Workforce Council and the Southeastern CT Enterprise Region (seCTer) board, President Espy works to address the workforce and economic development needs of the state and region. She is a member of the Executive Committee of the Connecticut Council for Independent Colleges and the National Association of Independent Colleges and Universities, serving on the Student Aid Committee.

President Espy received her Ph.D. from Syracuse University, her master’s degree from Miami University of Ohio, and her bachelor’s degree from Berea College.

History of Mitchell College

ON SEPTEMBER 14, 1938, a group of New London citizens founded New London Junior College as a private, nonprofit, coeducational two-year college in their community. In 1950, the name Mitchell College was officially adopted by the trustees to honor the descendants of the Alfred Mitchell family, principal benefactors of the College since its founding. The high quality of Mitchell's academic program was recognized in 1956 when the College was awarded membership in the New England Commission of Higher Education. Taking a leading role in educating students with learning differences, Mitchell established its specialized learning center, now called the Bentsen Learning Center, in 1981.

IN 1998 the College offered its first baccalaureate program in the area of human development, and today the College offers 4-year degrees in 14 programs of study as well as two associate degrees.

In 2006 Mitchell launched Thames Academy (now Thames at Mitchell College). This distinctive program provides students who are neurodivergent or have learning differences or physical challenges a structured experience on a college campus to gain skills for a successful transition to college or other pursuits.

Another step in the continuum of support, the STAIRS post-graduate program is a living-learning option for neurodivergent learners who have completed a degree.

IN 2007 Mitchell College officially joined the Division III National Collegiate Athletic Association (NCAA) and was a founding member of the New England Collegiate Conference (NECC), where we earned championship titles across multiple years in many sports. In the 2023–24 academic year Mitchell joined the Great Northeast Athletic Conference (GNAC).

The Mitchell Seal

THE MITCHELL SEAL, seen on the cover of this booklet, represents the educational mission and vision of the College. The Latin inscription “scientia” and “libertas” signify the two academic degrees: the sciences and the liberal arts. The lighthouse depicted in the center of the seal pays tribute to Mitchell's location on the Thames River at the mouth of Long Island Sound. The lighthouse and its beams of light symbolize both a beacon of guidance for students and their search for knowledge.

Presidential Medallion

THE PRESIDENTIAL MEDALLION is a symbol of the authority entrusted in a president. Worn as part of the academic regalia at all formal occasions, this insignia of office prominently features the Mitchell Seal, declaring the president's dedication to the educational mission and vision of the College.

The Mace

DURING THE MIDDLE AGES the wood mace clad in metal was an effective weapon in battle, but as newer and more powerful arms developed, it was transformed into a symbol of dignity and authority.

THE EARLIEST CEREMONIAL MACES were borne by bodyguards of 12th-century English and French kings. By the end of the 16th century, they were used widely. The ceremonial mace is found in the British House of Parliament, carried before ecclesiastical dignitaries and in university and college convocations.

THE MITCHELL COLLEGE MACE was created by former faculty member Richard Ruth for the inauguration of President Bruce Swinburne in 1987. The mace precedes the president in processions and traditionally is carried by a senior faculty member. It represents the president's responsibility as the chief academic and administrative officer of the College.

Academic Regalia

AMERICAN ACADEMIC DRESS draws from traditions that date back to medieval European universities. Traditions were standardized in 1896 when the colleges and universities in the United States adopted a uniform code governing academic dress.

THE GOWN is normally black, although several colleges and universities have authorized optional gowns in the institution's colors. The cut of the gown indicates the level of the degree. The bachelor's gown is simple and recognized by its long, pointed sleeves. The master's gown is fuller and its sleeves are square at the ends. The gown for the doctorate degree is more elaborate, cut full with velvet down the front and around the neck of the gown. The sleeves are bell shaped and decorated with three horizontal chevrons.

THE HOOD is the most distinctive feature of academic regalia. It was originally used as a shoulder cape and as a receptacle in which to collect alms. The length of the hood and width of its velvet border indicate the level of the degree. The color of the border indicates the field of study in which the degree was earned, and the inner lining bears the colors of the institution that conferred the degree.

The Star–Spangled Banner
